

The Line 3 Replacement Program will provide a broad range of participation opportunities for qualified local and Indigenous goods and services providers in the prairie provinces. Many other area businesses, such as hotels, grocery stores and restaurants, will also benefit from the presence of work crews during project construction.

### **Project timing**

Our project teams are planning to start construction in the summer of 2017 in Canada, with the pipeline anticipated to be in-service in 2019.

#### Subcontracting opportunities

The majority of business opportunities will be subcontracted through our primary construction contractors. We encourage them to use local and Indigenous contractors who meet our standards of quality, service, cost-competitiveness and socio-economic performance.

Potential subcontracting opportunities typical to Enbridge construction activities include:

During the planning stages, Enbridge may directly source certain services including: environmental surveying; geotechnical studies; tree planting; stockpile site location and preparation; and security fencing.

## A sustainable supply chain process

Enbridge is committed to ensuring that significant opportunities are provided to communities in the vicinity of our projects and operations. To ensure follow-through on this commitment, we've established a Supply Chain team, responsible for engagement of local and Indigenous businesses in Enbridge's projects and operations across the country. This team oversees implementation of a new and enhanced process for project and operations procurement.

Where competitive proposals are required, prospective contractors must provide a draft Socio-Economic Plan (SEP) as part of their proposal response. Success for any contractor will depend, in part, on how well they understand, appreciate, and plan for the execution of their SEP.

Enbridge will review all draft SEPs and provide support as necessary through the Request for Proposal (RFP) process. Successful businesses will be contractually obligated to deliver on the commitments and strategies agreed to within their SEP, which in turn will support Enbridge in meeting or exceeding our ongoing socio-economic objectives.

# What happens after I make my submission to Enbridge? How will I know if you're interested?


An Enbridge representative will contact you if your materials and/or services are a match to our current needs. Skilled suppliers are important to our success and we thank everyone for their interest.

## What qualifications will my business need to work on this project?

Work cannot commence without a signed contract in place. First, your company must demonstrate that you have the following:

- A certificate of incorporation
- Proof of registration and good standing with the applicable Workers' Compensation Board (or equivalent)
- Proof of insurance that meets Enbridge's requirements

For certain services, Enbridge requires pre-qualification which may include quality, technical, health, safety and/or financial reviews. Contractors may also be required to be registered and in good standing with ISNetworld.

## Where do I get more information on the Enbridge procurement process?

#### Are there any special requirements?

Where competitive proposals are required, Enbridge requires prospective contractors to provide a draft Socio-Economic Plan as part of their proposal. Enbridge will review and negotiate with the contractor in preparing a final plan submission. Successful businesses will be required to provide regular progress reports to ensure they are achieving the contractually binding commitments set out within their SEP.

## Why the emphasis on socio-economic performance?

Enbridge is committed to ensuring Indigenous and local communities impacted by our projects and operations receive socio-economic benefit opportunities. This initiative is one way we hope to meet this objective.

## Indigenous participation

Enbridge is committed to providing economic opportunities, such as employment, training and the procurement of goods and services from competitive and qualified Indigenous businesses.

#### We will achieve this by:

- Identifying business capacity and employment opportunities within local Indigenous communities early in a project;
- Assisting Indigenous businesses prequalification and vendor certification;
- Providing our general contractors with a detailed database of Indigenous businesses with the capacity to provide ancillary services; and
- Requiring all prospective contractors to submit a Socio-Economic Plan that provides detailed information on Indigenous participation.
